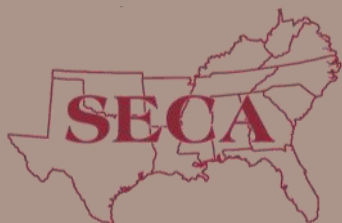

We will begin by examining the adult learner, particularly how women learn. Practical issues such as why people are taking the training, what they expect to get from it, and how they will internalize it will be a focus. Workshop structures will be created to help you, as the trainer, pace the day while covering the content. We will examine the goals of your workshop and assess if these have been achieved while thinking of ways to help participants take the information back and actually use it—not forget it. Strategies that support active learning in a meaningful way will become tools to help achieve these goals.
