Notes

- The Pew Children’s Dental Campaign **grades states on an A-through-F scale**, based on each state’s performance in meeting eight policy benchmarks for children’s dental health.
- The **eight policy benchmarks** are:
 - **Policy Benchmark 1: Having sealant programs in at least 25 percent of high risk schools.**
Dental sealants are clear plastic coatings applied to the chewing surfaces of molars that block food and bacteria from gathering in those teeth. Sealants can prevent 60% of tooth decay at 1/3 the cost of filling a cavity.
 - **Policy Benchmark #2: Allowing a hygienist to place sealants in a school-based program without requiring a dentist’s exam.** Some states require that children see a dentist before sealants are placed. Hygienist’s are the primary dental providers in school based settings.
 - **Policy Benchmark #3: Providing optimally fluoridated water to at least 75% of residents who are served by public systems.** Pew found that 28 states succeeded in bringing fluoridated water to at least 75% of its citizens on public supplies.
 - **Policy Benchmark #4: Meeting or exceeding the 2007 national average (38.1%) of Medicaid-enrolled children ages 1 to 18 receiving dental services.** Only 11 states (**Arkansas**, Idaho, Iowa, Massachusetts, Nebraska, New Hampshire, **North Carolina**, **South Carolina**, **Texas**, Vermont and Washington) served more than half of Medicaid-enrolled kids in 2009.
 - **Policy Benchmark #5: Paying dentists who serve Medicaid-enrolled children at least the 2008 national average (60.5%) of median retail fees.** A 2010 Government Accountability Office (GAO) report found that in 25 of 39 reporting states, fewer than half of dentists saw any Medicaid patients.
 - **Policy Benchmark #6: Reimbursing medical care providers through state Medicaid programs for preventive dental health services.** In the past year, more state Medicaid programs, including **Georgia**, began to reimburse medical providers for delivering preventive dental services.
 - **Policy Benchmark #7: Authorizing a new type of primary care dental provider.** Only Minnesota currently authorizes an allied dental provider (similar to a nurse practitioner).
 - **Policy Benchmark #8: State submits basic screening data to the national database that tracks oral health conditions.** Among 42 submitting states, the data from 10 are more than five years old, which limits the value of basing decisions on these statistics.

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The Arkansas Story: Going from an “F” to a “C”

The report highlighted several states that had made strides to improve their scores, and Arkansas was one of those states singled out as having made significant progress.

According to the report:

When Arkansas received an “F” from Pew’s report card in 2010, policymakers seized on the failing grade as an opportunity to reinvigorate the state’s oral health coalition and pursue needed policy changes. *“I looked at Arkansas’ grade and I immediately thought, ‘We can do better than this’,”* said state Senator David Johnson, who helped lead the state’s efforts. One year later, Arkansas’ grade is a “C”.

The state improved its grade because of progress in two areas:

1. The state increased its share of Medicaid children who receive actual dental care, making it one of the top ranking states nationally.
2. The state changed a law that created a hurdle for dental hygienists to place sealants on children’s teeth.

Arkansas is poised to make additional progress because of other laws that its legislature enacted in 2011.

- One of these laws allows pediatricians and other medical personnel to receive Medicaid reimbursement for providing preventive dental services to children.
- Another law will expand water fluoridation to many more communities, extending this cavity protection to an estimated 640,000 additional Arkansans.

“Policy change is often a test of persistence, and patience is still a virtue,” said Dr. Lynn Mouden, director of the state’s Office of Oral Health. *“The passage of the fluoridation bill in Arkansas was the culmination of 11 years of work, with the dentists, hygienists, advocates and the state oral health coalition all partnering with our office.”*
